
Philothea is the imaginary perfect woman of St. Francis, and one who always makes the right decision. Knowing we are human, St. Francis supplies us with remedies for various

CHAPTER 1 — True Devotion

THERE is but one true devotion and many which are false and deceitful. If you cannot distinguish that which is true, you may easily fall victim to the false one, even amuse yourself by following some fantastic and superstitious devotion.

Everyone paints devotion according to his own passion and fancy. If you are addicted to fasting and think yourself very devout, yet your heart is full of anger, jealousy or resentment, where is your charity? If you recite a multiplicity of prayers, then tear your neighbor apart with words sharp as a two-edged sword, does this not counteract your charity? That is a false devotion.

Many persons by covering themselves with certain external actions belonging to devotion make the world believe that they are truly devout. In reality, they are nothing but statues and phantoms of devotion.

True devotion, Philothea, presupposes, not a partial but a thorough love of God. Divine love adorns the soul, it is called grace, making 30 *PART 1*

CHAPTER 9 — First Meditation On Our Creation

Preparation

PLACE yourself in the presence of God. 2. Beseech Him to inspire you.

Considerations

- 1. Consider that so many years ago you were not yet in the world and that your being was a nothing. Where were we, my soul, at that time? The world had already existed a long time, and we were not yet known.
- 2. God has drawn you out of this nothingness to make you what you now are, out of His goodness and with no need of you.
- 3. Consider the being that God has given to you. It is the greatest in this visible world, capable of eternal life and of being perfectly united to His Divine Majesty.

Affections and resolutions

- 1. Humble yourself profoundly before God, saying from your heart with the Psalmist, "O Lord, my whole being is as nothing before You, and You love me."
- 2. Return thanks to God. My Great and Good Creator, how much I thank You since You have drawn me out of nothing, and by Your mercy make me what I am. What can I do to bless Your Name and give You thanks for your inestimable goodness?


Sixth Meditation On Judgment

Preparation

PLACE yourself before God. 2. Beseech Him to inspire you.

Considerations

- 1. After the time God has prescribed for the duration of this world, a fire will reduce the earth to ashes. Nothing that exists will escape its fury.
- 2. After this deluge of flames, all men will rise from their graves, and at the voice of the Angel they will appear in the valley of Josaphat. Some will rise with a glorious and resplendent body, others in bodies most hideous.
- 3. Consider the majesty with which the Sovereign Judge will appear, surrounded by the Angels and Saints. Before Him will be borne His cross, shining more brilliantly than the sun; a standard of mercy to the good and of punishment to the wicked.
- 4. The Sovereign Judge will separate the good from the bad, placing the one at His right hand and the other at His left.
- 5. This separation being made, all men will see the malice of the wicked and the penitence of the good and the effect of grace which they

CHAPTER 1 — Of the Necessity of Prayer

PRAYER places our understanding in the brightness and light of God and exposes our will to the heat of heavenly love. Nothing so effectively purges our understanding from its ignorance and our will from its affections.

Above all, I recommend to you mental prayer, or the prayer of the heart. That which has for its object the life and passion of our Lord. By making Him the frequent subject of your meditation, your whole soul will be replenished with Him; you will imbibe His spirit in all your actions. He is the light of the world. It is in Him, by Him, and for Him that we ought to be enlightened. We, by keeping close to our Savior by meditation and observing His words and actions, shall by the help of His grace, find access to God the Father, but only through this gate.

We could never contemplate the divinity in this world had we not been united to the sacred humanity of our Savior, whose life and death is the most delightful, sweet, and profitable object we can select for our ordinary meditation.
